In VLF funding paid annually to counties and cities in full, with San Mateo County and its cities deprived their full amount due

THE ISSUE

In 2004, the State replaced traditional local Vehicle License Fee (VLF) revenue with an equivalent funding stream. The payment mechanism that used to deliver full funding has become obsolete here, leaving San Mateo County and its cities blocked from receiving the full amount due without State action.

The State distributes more than \$12 billion annually in VLF replacement funds statewide. San Mateo County is one of the only counties not receiving what it is owed – leaving the County and its 20 cities without the funding they were promised. This funding loss is the result of an outdated State payment mechanism the State has refused to fix.

WHAT'S AT STAKE

This funding supports essential local services that residents, businesses, commuters, visitors, and families rely on every day. Without this funding and a permanent solution, our communities face real and immediate risk to vital public services:

Housing & Homelessness

- Nearly 3,000 people could lose shelter access
- 5,500+ households at risk of losing rental assistance increasing risk of homelessness

Health & Public Safety

- Cuts to mental health care, crisis response, and wildfire prevention.
- Fewer nurses, police officers, firefighters, and emergency responders

Children & Families

- 7,400 children could lose access to early literacy programs.

Core Local Services

- Reductions to libraries, parks, youth and seniors programs
- Delayed road repairs and infrastructure maintenance causing higher long-term costs

A QUESTION OF FAIRNESS

Every other Bay Area county receives its full funding – San Mateo County does not. Local residents contribute billions to state revenues annually. The State is not honoring the same commitment made to all 58 counties. San Mateo County and its cities are not asking for anything more than what they are owed.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS ARE UNITED

The County and all 20 cities are aligned and taking action:

- Impacted counties and cities will be deprived of essential funding for critical services if this problem is not solved
- The County is working with state legislators to secure full funding and a permanent legislative fix.
- The County is making sure state legislators, the Governor, and the public are informed.

THE SOLUTION

1. Full Repayment of Funds Due

Immediate State action to fully fund the promised payments in the current State budget.

2. A Permanent Legislative Fix

Ensure San Mateo County is treated the same as all other counties – now and permanently.
